# Environmental Scans 101: What Environmental Scans Can Look Like

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Environmental scans should use well-established analytical tools to ensure their effectiveness. Two of the most common tools are the PESTLE and SWOT analyses.<sup>1,2,3</sup> Each analysis has a specific purpose. Completing these scans can help answer many questions that may arise during your strategic planning efforts. Below are the elements of these analyses and examples of questions they can help answer. Consider what questions you want answered when deciding what type of environmental scan to conduct.

## PESTLE

PESTLE scans help explore the external environment's impact on the community

POLITICAL

Government policies and political issues and trends

**Example:** Are there city council members interested in improving the enforcement of alcohol and tobacco minimum legal purchase age statutes?



Income, employment, and other measures of prosperity

**Example:** How strong is the correlation between neighborhood economic status and substance use prevalence rates?



Demographics, personal attitudes and beliefs, and values

Example: What are community attitudes towards substance use and addiction?



Innovations and their community availability and impact

**Example:** How widespread is broadband internet access in the community, and how does it impact participation in prevention education efforts?



Laws and regulations

**Example:** What is the legal status of fentanyl test strips in the state?



The physical environment

**Example:** What public spaces are available to host a parent education event?







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## **SWOT**

SWOT analyses examine how internal and external environments affect an organization

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#### **STRENGTHS**

Internal assets and advantages

Example: How many of our staff are certified prevention specialists?



#### **WEAKNESSES**

Internal hurdles and disadvantages

Example: Do we lack organizational leadership that actively supports prevention services?



#### **OPPORTUNITIES**

External supports and facilitators

Example: What pre-existing relationships with other organizations can support new prevention initiatives?



#### **THREATS**

External obstacles and challenges

Example: Is there a risk of losing external funding that currently supports prevention?
